Dunlap Community Hospital Invests \$1.1 Million in Community Health Benefits

In 2010, Dunlap Community Hospital invested \$1,102,500 through programs, community outreach and activities and services defined by the recognized national authority on community benefit reporting, the Catholic Health Association of the United States (CHA). The totals shown in this report reflect the community health benefits in the fiscal year that ended December 31, 2010.

We are pleased to report the following, which illustrates the strong commitment that Dunlap Community Hospital has made to the people of Orrville and surrounding communities.

Community benefits

Programs or activities that provide treatment or promote health and healing as a response to identified community needs and meet at least one of these objectives:

- Improve access to health care service
- Enhance the health of the community
- Advance medical or health care knowledge
- Relieve or reduce the burden of government or other community efforts.

Community Health Improvement Services \$139,531

Persons Served - 16,143

These activities are carried out to improve community health, extend beyond patient care activities and are usually subsidized by the health care organization. Such services do not generate patient care bills although they may involve a nominal fee.

Financial and In-Kind Contributions \$5,775

Persons Served - 1,094

This category includes funds and in-kind services donated to individuals not affiliated with the organization or to community groups and other not-for-profit organizations. In-kind services include hours contributed by staff to the community while on health care organization work time, overhead expenses of space donated to not-for-profit community groups (such as for meetings) and the donation of food, equipment, and supplies.

Charity Care and Bad Debt

Hospital Care Assurance Program is provided to uninsured individuals that meet the poverty guidelines. \$367,856

Bad Debt results when patients do not pay for services where payment is expected. \$1,706,775

In House Charity Care Program \$230,944

Health Professions Education \$81,642

Persons Served - 287

This category includes providing a clinical setting for undergraduate/vocational training, internships/clerkships/residencies, and residency education for physicians, nurses and medical students; funding for staff education that is linked to community services and health improvement; nursing scholarships or tuition payments for professional education to non-employees and volunteers; and a clinical setting for undergraduate training for lab and other technicians.

Community Building Activities \$1,119

Persons Served - 332

Community-building activities include programs that address the root causes of health problems, such as poverty, homelessness, and environmental problems. These activities support community assets by offering the expertise and resources of the health care organization. Costs for these activities include cash, in-kind donations, and budgeted expenditures for the development of a variety of community-building programs and partnerships.
